Description of Service:

Many years ago when Camille Devaney attended Marquette University they promised that they would educate not only her mind but also her heart. Their motto "Men and woman for others" became implanted in her heart. Every single day it motivates her. There is no end to the love and care she shows to those in need. During her career she spent twenty years in acedmnia and twenty years at Abbott. The last ten years spent in Europe overseeing the manufacturing of drugs. Even during these busy years she found time to volunteer at her children's school and attend night school to prepare her for service to the Church. She took two years of night courses at Mundelein Seminary to prepare her to coordinate the Adult Ed program at St. Mary's. At the same time she was preparing to become a spiritual director for the Christ Renews his Parish retreat that took place at St Mary's for many years. These weekend retreats were life changing for many. Finally it came time for her to retire. She was looking for what would come next. She felt she was called to serve in the Ignatian Volunteer Corps. IVC provides men and women opportunities to serve others and to transform lives. IVC matches the talents of experienced volunteers with the greatest social needs. Camille was asked to provide service to those suffering from addictions and to those in need in Lake County. She decided to team up with our sharing parish Most Blessed Trinity in Waukegan. Her service to those with addictions took her to skid row where she would meet those seeking help and take them to retreat centers that provided them with direction to aid them in their quest to overcome their demons. Her service in Lake County was to establish an outreach to the nursing homes. There she brings them communion and arranges for mass to be said at their home.. She becomes personal friends with people who have no one else. With her they have someone who cares. She shops for them, takes them to church and brings them treats. She is an active member of MBT. She is supportive to their staff and helps provide Adult Ed. On Monday nights.....even Christmas she sleeps at the House of Peace in Waukegan. It is a home that offers shelter to abused women and their children. During Covid while many of the above services are suspended she has become a driver for meals on wheel five days a week. She picks up fifteen meals every day and delivers them in Waukegan. That means she makes fifteen separate stops. Once again she has formed friendships with people that are living alone. She goes out of her way to provide them with conversation and homemade treats. At Christmas she delivered gifts to these people who were moved to tears. One man so happy that he had a new warm blanket and a new flannel shirt. Thru the Jesuits she has gone on service trips to Africa, Peru, Ecuador, Cambodia and India. She stays in very humble places on these trips. I have seen little children on her lap in Africa, pictures of her teaching in Cambodia in knee deep water and most recently heard stories about visiting Mother Teresas death hospital in India. She said the tears just

flowed not only as she saw the dying but also the young college students who took a semester to serve in this home. She said there are no words to describe their kindness. I have had the privilege of cooking with Camille at Camp Hope for the last fifteen years. Some days it is a lot of "heavy lifting." But I have to say that we have more fun and experience more joy than you could imagine. Camille sees the face of God in all the people that she serves. She feels such great joy in making their lives better. Just walking beside her is a privilege. When we are alone in the kitchen at Camp Hope there is a happiness that is hard to describe.

Camille Devaney grew up Milwaukee, WI attended and graduated from Marquette University with a science major. There she was exposed to and embraced Ignatian Spirituality of "men and women for others" and finding God in all things." The philosophy of the importance of service became the focus of her life. " She and her husband, John and three sons moved to Lake Bluff in 1976. Immediately she began volunteering at the grammar school until the boys finished fifth grade. Thus, her volunteering life was launched. She joined the parish Council at St. Mary's and taught CCD to fifth graders for a year. She decided to take the training to be a spiritual director for a new archdiocesan program called Christ Renews His Parish. When that ended after a few years, she enrolled in an archdiocesan program at Mundelein and coordinated the Adult Program for the parish. At the time, she was serving as a Eucharistic and Minister of Care. Camille's background was science. She spent 20 years in academia and 20 years in corporate America: ten years at Abbott in North Chicago and then after the sudden death of her dear husband, John, she agreed to work for Abbott overseas in Italy and Germany for the next 10 years, coming home intermittently for short periods. When retirement loomed, not one to take up knitting afghans or taking art classes, she googled Service Opportunities and made contact with the pastor of Most Blessed Trinity parish in Waukegan and began to go weekly to two nursing homes, to bring Eucharist, and arrange for monthly Mass, healing services and reconciliation for the residents. The COVID-19 has put this on hold. She also coordinated adult ed with the staff of MBT. She began to go to the food pantry at that site for a while, and then transitioned to being an overnight support person at the shelter for abused women and their children, and soon became part of their families, learning some Spanish and getting some Spanish recipes. She eventually joined the Ignatian Volunteer Corp, an outreach program for men and women in recovery from various addictions, and was always happy to see people heal and change their lives. She has been a volunteer for several summers at the end of July with Camp Hope, for children with disabilities, and their "buddies," young people that come to help these children have a fun time, and giving their parents a period of respite. Camille usually was involved with food preparation and clean up. Camille has traveled extensively with some of the Jesuits as service trips, to several 3rd world counties, like Africa, El Salvador, Peru, India, Ecuador, and has witnessed first hand the difficult conditions and the many difficult challenges and struggles of those people trying to survive at the low end of their societies. At the present time, Camille is involved with Catholic Charities, doing meals on wheels to low-income people in Waukegan five days a week. She has developed a friendly relationship with each of them and they are always happy to see her. They always have interesting things to tell her about their relatives, neighbors, living situation, weather

etc. She could write a book, and it would be hilarious, maybe even a best seller. They look forward to her visit and appreciate the conversation and the treats she sometimes brings. She also helps with the Catholic Charities Christmas gift packing and distribution each December.
